By communication with the administration and officials of the state, it works to solve the problems of the students. This is especially important as students are trying to find their place in today's society. Most noticeable to the students, it sponsors entertainment in the form of weekly dances and movies, and occasional cultural activities. It also funds SCRIPTS, the student literary magazine, and PORPHYRY, the student yearbook.

The Council is composed of representatives from the freshman, sophomore, junior, senior, and graduate classes. In addition to these representatives, four representatives-at-large are elected from the student body. The executive offices are filled by a President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

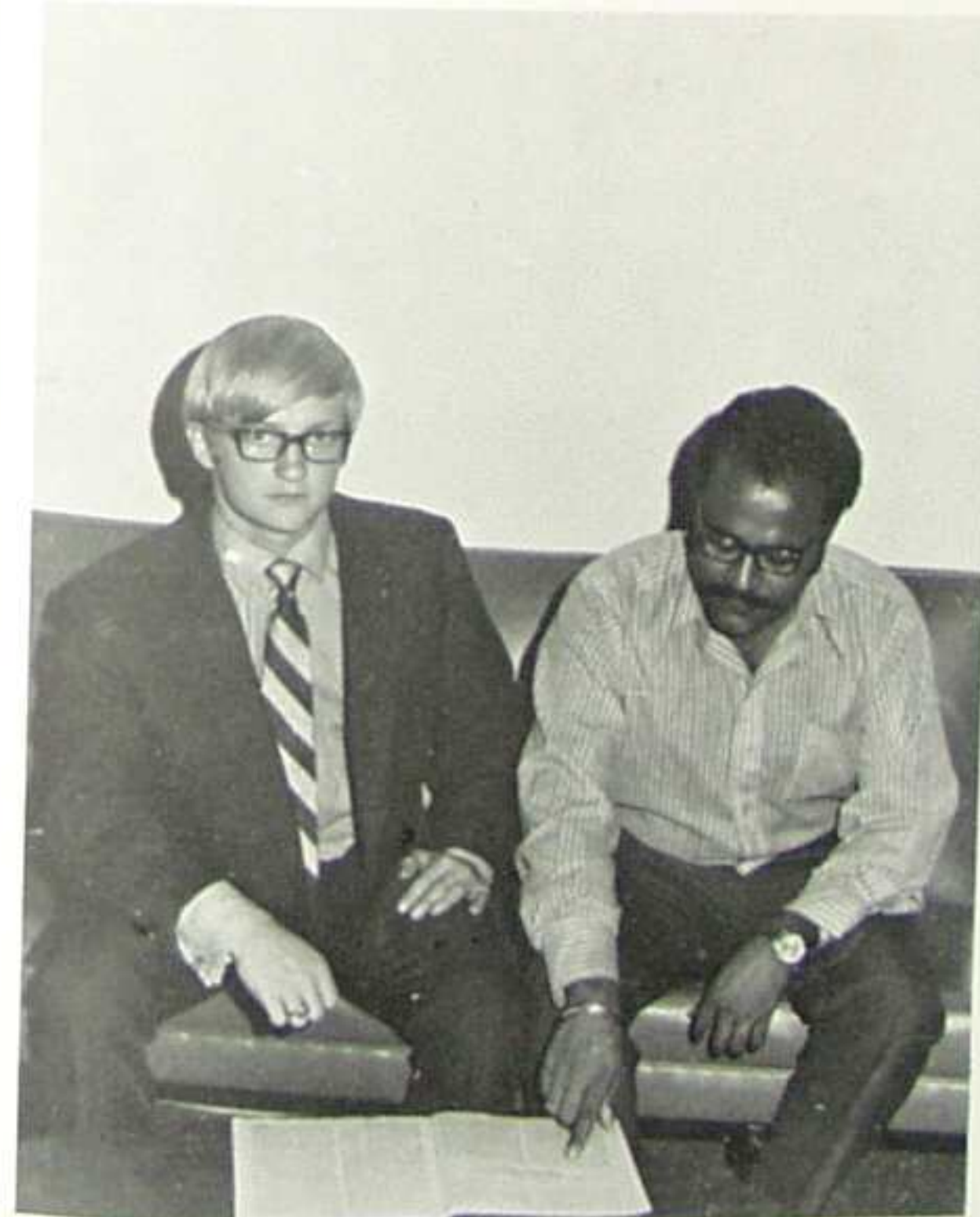

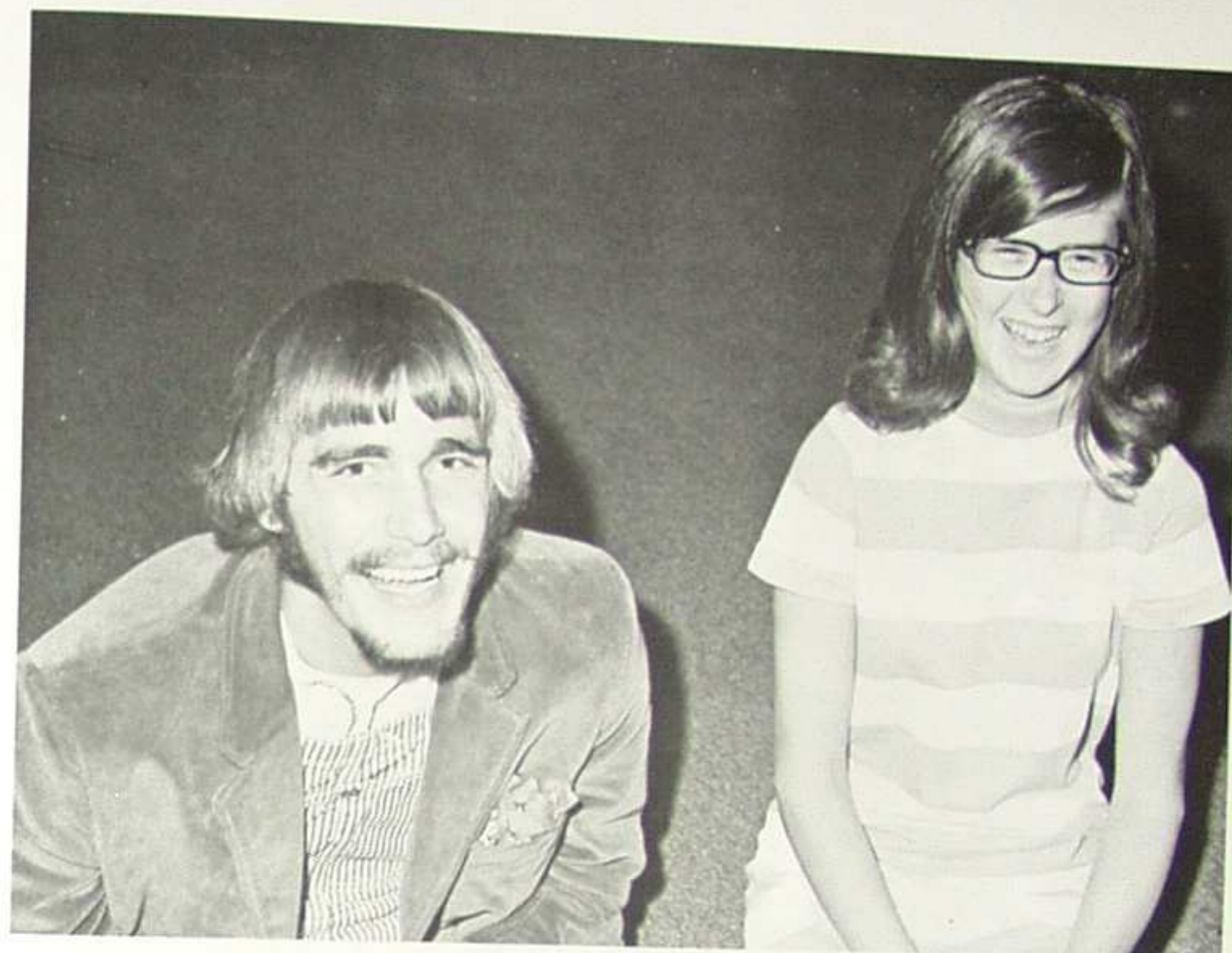

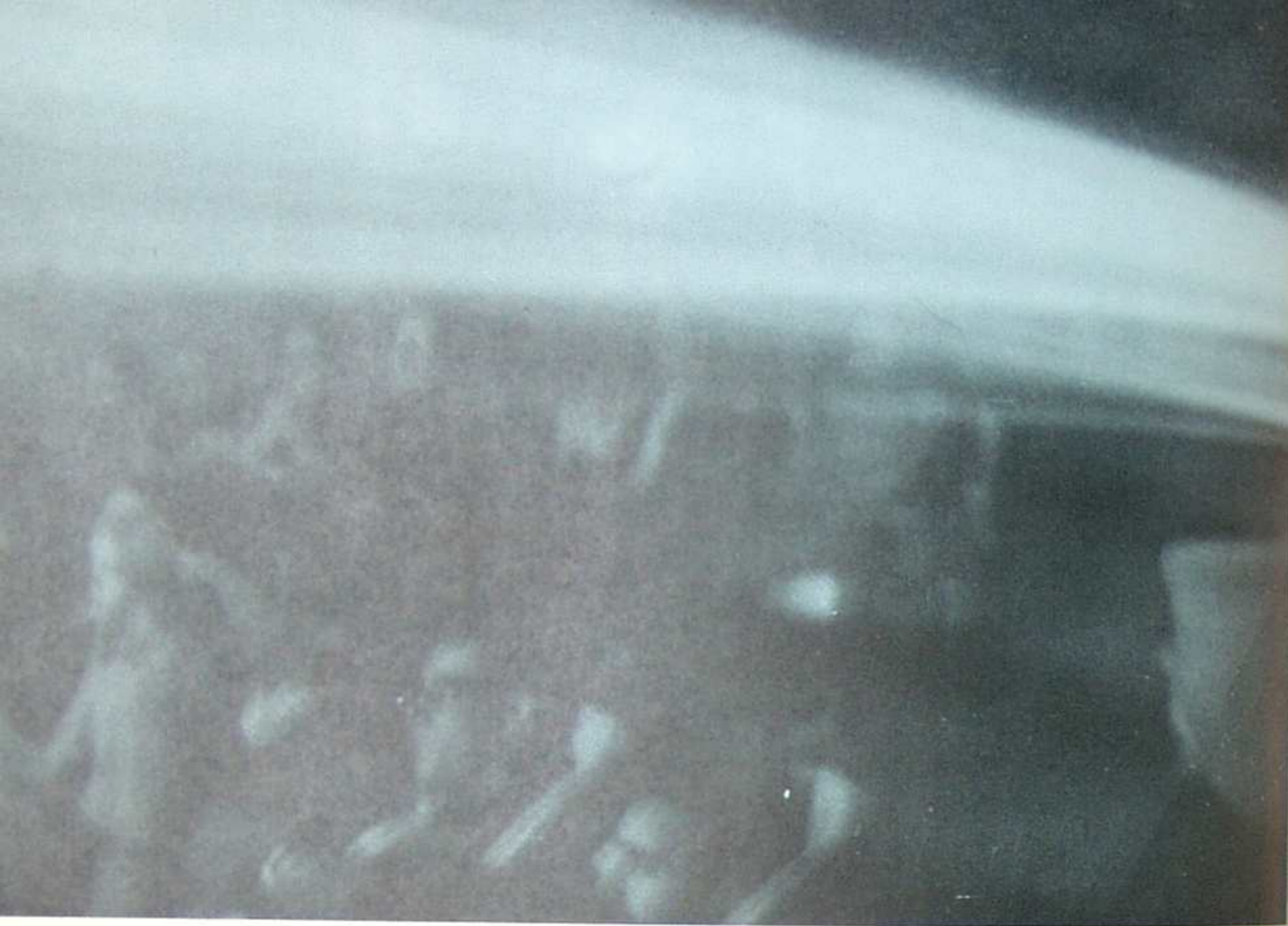
